Wild Flower of the Month **Autumn Lady's Tresses**



As autumn approaches, I welcome the fresh crispness of the air in the early mornings. The vegetable garden has slowed down; the pumpkins are ripening to a rich orange and finally the courgettes have stopped producing new fruits! Wildflowers too, are fading and saving their glories for the following year. But there are some that flower at this time of year and the orchid, Autumn Lady's Tresses, is one of them.

It is a slender and graceful plant with a flowering spike no more than 3-10cm high. The small white flowers spiral up the stem, interestingly in either direction, thus giving the plant its Latin name Spiranthes spiralis. Most orchids are rare, and this plant is no exception. Therefore, you can imagine my astonishment that, whilst on a visit to my parents New Forest home, I spotted one on their front lawn. My father had recently put his back out so the grass, which had always been a mix of low growing wildflowers (weeds to most gardeners) had not been cut for a week or two. There amongst the hawkweeds, daises, plantains and selfheal was a single orchid. At the time I was on the telephone gazing out at the garden so my conversation was interrupted by an exclamation of surprise and delight. I have since seen patches of Autumn Lady's Tresses growing in sandy grassland around Brockenhurst but I will never forget the first time I saw this beautiful little plant. Julie Palmer

Church Pedestals

She assured me that they should still be around and were probably being stored in – where else but – the Storeroom in the Church, having been put there due to Covid restrictions about anyone putting fresh flowers in the building.

Hugh's wine review ... on Claret

What can legitimately be termed Claret? I'm sure you a know the answer. I am going to tell you nevertheless! It is the fine red wine grown and produced in the region of France around Bordeaux in the south west of the country. It is the largest fine wine region on earth. There are hundreds, perhaps thousands of vineyards, some huge, many tiny, so why so many and why so good? The climate is generally propitious and the various terroirs offer differing qualities and subtleties according to the variety of soil. Systems of grading have evolved in an attempt to establish intelligible distinctions. We talk with reverence about château bottles. Again why? There are a huge number of châteaux and each one guarantees the wines are grown on the estate, as opposed to being blended. There are famous châteaux, far too many to list, but the regions of Margaux, Pauillac, Haut Medoc, Saint-Émilion, Pomerol, and St-Julien provide a large percentage of them. The Châteaux themselves are classified and graded, complex to say the least. I don't believe there are many experts on claret. How could there be in this forest of possibilities in this extraordinary melange of delights? To try every château bottle would take a lifetime, but what a life!

For me the region around Saint-Émilion stands out but that is largely because it produces wine rich in tannins and that wine is readily available in England and is to be found on the shelves of most dealers and supermarkets. My choice of claret for the month is : Lussac Saint-Émilion 2018 which is presently available at Sainsburys at £7.50 when discounted. Typically it would cost more than £10, but because it is given the appellation of a Grand Vin De Bordeaux it commands one's respect. Beware, however, of labels, which all too often belie desperate marketing ploys! Premier Cru great clarets generate huge prices and exceed the old budget more than somewhat! Good claret can be laid down for many years and usually improves with the keeping, horizontal of course at 56 degrees Fahrenheit, Good luck!

notably Sauternes are worthy of another chapter! As an amusing footnote the most minute vineyards, those where the vignerons grow their grapes in their gardens and produce the wine in small barns or outhouses, these growers are known as garagistes!

Statistics; Grapes used; Cabernet and merlot. Over six million hectolitres in a good year. Problems, hail storms, drought, lack of sun, disease and floods.

Disastrous times in Kabul

The situation in Afghanistan is creating a lot of questions in the UK and throughout the world, however one pertinent question I have is why did so many of my colleagues in the British Army sacrifice so much, for so little?

Although I didn't serve in Afghanistan (but I did serve in Bosnia and Iraq), I have plenty of friends who did. Some of them didn't come home, some came home with severe physical injuries, some came home with severe psychological injuries, while others came home seemingly unaffected. In the 20 years of deployment, 457 British



soldiers died in Afghanistan, and a further 6,600 were medically evacuated from the country (not to mention the countless Afghans who lost their lives). This is a very high price to pay for what can only be considered a 20-year speed bump in the rise of the Taliban.

Next year we will see the 40th Anniversary of the Falkland's War, where we will gather to remember those who gave their lives to liberate a different population in a different part of the world. Many will be reflecting on the fact that, 40 years on, the British Army has regressed and is now no longer capable of, or willing to, independently secure an area as small as an airfield in a country where it has been operating for 20 years - we are completely beholden to the US. What does this say about the UK's ability to hold its place on the world stage?

There will be those who say that the Taliban have changed; with open press conferences, and talk of an inclusive culture towards women, they are certainly talking the talk, however there is a real concern that they won't walk the walk. They are clever enough to know that the Western World will not have the will to interfere again, and so it wouldn't surprise me to see a gradual slip into the Taliban's very harsh interpretation of Sharia Law over the next few years. I hope that I am wrong.

While things are unclear about the next few weeks in Kabul, what is clear is that the Taliban will now get another chance at running Afghanistan, with little physical interference from the US and the UK, and it would seem my colleagues' efforts were for no purpose, but I pray for those who may well come onto the Taliban's radar as having helped the West, and whom we have left behind.

Update from Colin & Audrey Gibson Kilmersdon's Missionaries in Lebanon



Thousands of people recently gathered to mark the first anniversary of the catastrophic explosion at the Port of Beirut on August 4th last year that killed over 200 people, injured over 6000 and left around 300,000 homeless. Marches from various parts of Beirut culminated in an outdoor Mass at the site of the explosion presided over by Patriarch Bechara Boutros Al-Rai of the Maronite Church. The memories were clearly difficult for many, especially the relatives of those who died and who were given a special place at the service.

Sadly, there is also much anger as there is still no clear indication of who was responsible for the disaster. The political establishment has closed ranks and prevented any meaningful investigation. Some of this anger boiled over into violence in other parts of Beirut. Fortunately, the demonstrations were not too extensive with only about 8 people hospitalised, though one of our younger American friends who ventured into town suffered breathing problems after being caught by tear gas, used to disperse the demonstrators. We decided to keep a low profile and watched the commemoration on tv – sometimes with the split screen showing the Mass and the demonstrations happening simultaneously.

"Here to cure your hunger"....is the slogan of the 'Vaxine Burger Van' which we drive past regularly and which goes to show that the Lebanese people can still can see the funny side of life at times, despite the long list of



difficulties facing them, the latest being a shortage of bottled gas (used by nearly everyone for cooking) and the possible removal of subsidies on petrol. The van was set up when restaurants were closed due to Covid and, as far as we can see, continues to do a good trade. Spot the 'Immune Cow' burger on the rear door!

Kilmersdon Loco

Kilmersdon, the last surviving steam loco from the Somerset coalfield, is now taking people on joy rides on Hampshire's Watercress Line. Built in 1929 in Bristol by Pickett and Sons it was named after the Kilmersdon colliery where it spent most of its life hauling working wagons from mine head to the rope incline connection with the North Somerset Line for coal shipment to the Portishead power station near Bristol. It was overhauled in 2013 and reappeared in immaculent Prussian Blue livery, and many will have seen it on shunting displays on the Somerset and Dorset Railway Trust in Washford, whom we thank for this information. *Photo by Matt Bentley*.

Design your dream garden -Kilmersdon Gardeners - July Meeting 2021

This month Marion Dale helped the Gardeners to focus on the factors to consider when creating a garden. Marion came to garden design as a second career. Just after training she won a gold medal at the Autumn Bath and West flower show and went on to create a show garden for Chelsea. This was her first face to face talk 0f 2021 after her Zoom lectures for the WEA.

The first choice to make is style – Cottage, Formal or Contemporary with lots of hard landscaping aiming for low maintenance, are the typical options. Then you need to work with the soil testing the pH to determine acid or alkaline. Honey Suckle and lilac doing well on alkaline and Camelia, Rhododendrons and Hibiscus thriving on acid soils. Shaking up a sample of soil in a jam jar to find the proportions of clay, sand, silt and organic material helps to determine the soil type when compared to a soil triangle. How much sun does the garden enjoy during the day? Lavender, Wall Flowers and Rock Rose thrive in sunshine while Ivy and Hydrangeas enjoy shade. It's important to check the maximum size for plants on the RHS website when making your choices to ensure they won't outgrow their space.

The planting choice can impact on the design of the space with trees adding height and evergreens as living focal points. A prickly Berberis hedge can stop people walking through. Evergreen hedges can divide spaces and give a backdrop to the garden. Some deciduous trees like the Ghost Birch with startlingly silver bark can provide a striking focus if illuminated with solar powered light in winter. Weeping varieties of trees like Pear and Crab Apple can provide interesting shapes.

It is important to look for indigenous plants that are attractive to wildlife. These are usually simple ones like Hawthorn, Dog Rose, Oxy-eye Daisy, Poppies. and Meadow Cranes Bill. The most impactful choice is the colour theme - will the mix aim at harmony or contrast? Warm or cool colours? The flower arranger's colour wheel can help. Marion finished by giving

examples of her designs.



PLAY AREA UPDATE

Summer 2021 has seen a number of changes to the play park. The installation of the new train to replace the one which was rotting took place in July, with the rotting balance beams of the trim trail being removed at the same time.

The new, longer zip wire was met with much enthusiasm in time for the summer holidays. Whilst it passed its post installation inspection, we are waiting for the wire to be re-tensioned to give a smoother ride!

Still to come at the play park, the large plastic slide on the multi play unit cracked and was taken down. SILVER BIRCH TREE IN THE PLAY PARK

The large silver birch at the entrance to the playing field is protected by a Tree Preservation Order. A request has been made to Mendip DC for the Parish Council arrange for the lower limbs to be removed so that the bench beneath it might be used again. If permission is granted, the Parish Council has agreed that the bench should be repaired at the same time.

Village Agent News

Hello, I hope like me you've enjoyed being able to meet others recently. More activities are starting up again and if you hear of anything, please let me know so I can share with our team and with everyone we speak to.

I attended my first **Zumba class with Laney** at Leigh on Mendip Village Hall this week. It was a lot of fun and a real boost, both physically and mentally!

A big thank you this month goes to the Wainwright Community fund, for their generous donation, which will allow us to support local residents in need.

This month I'm including a reminder of our work, as some new readers may not have heard of CCS agents.

What is a Village Agent?

The Village Agent service is part of the Community Council for Somerset (CCS) and offers free, confidential, practical support to anyone in need, including community groups. We have unrivalled local knowledge, and are problem solving solution finders!

I'm Nic, the Village Agent for Kilmersdon - I love the challenge of making a positive impact in our local community for people who need it most. It is very rewarding when a plan comes together, and a person's life is enhanced by the work I have done. I also love to chat! If needed, I work closely with your local GP surgery and the Adult Social Care team, so you have well rounded support.

Sounds Interesting but WHO can a Village Agent help?

A Village Agent can help if....

- You are an unpaid Carer or looking after someone else informally & need a little help & support – for you and the person you care for.
- You are struggling with a problem that can be fixed or improved by accessing the right people or services in the local community, but don't know where to turn.
- You live alone and are feeling lonely and isolated.
- You are part of a community with a collective problem & need a kick start to solve.

It doesn't matter how big or small the problem, we are here to help.

OK that's great – but HOW exactly can a Village Agent help?

It's probably easier to list the things Agents CAN'T do!

We don't like to pin down exactly how an Agent can help, as each person's situation is unique, but generally to make someone's everyday life better with the right connections, access to food, emergency funding or practical community-based solutions. A few recent examples are:

- Supported clients to access transport so that they can attend their vaccination appointments.
- Delivered food to families and individuals who are shielding or isolating & set up an arrangement with the local food bank to supply food to clients.
- Source & arrange delivery of white goods, furniture & household items to people in need.
- Made sure that the clients are supported to get the financial help they need.
- Arranged translations for clients who don't speak fluent English but need our support.
- Supported people who need help collecting prescriptions.
- Conducted welfare calls on behalf of local GP's to ensure clients are safe and well.
- Gave emotional support to people who are feeling isolated and lonely.
- Supported people & particularly unpaid carers by brokering a microprovider who can help with daily living tasks to alleviate some pressure & provided respite meals for Carers.
- Supported elderly Somerset residents to 'survive winter' by making sure that they have sufficient heating and cooking facilities. Distribute Surviving Winter grants.
- Gifted refurbished mobiles to people who are cut off from their family & friends.
- Helped people to get home from hospital or temporary accommodation.
- Helping people to stay independent in their homes.
- Found & made connections between clients & the right community-based support.


