

Our famous Jack & Jill plaques

David Brown who carved the legend and descriptive pictures on Kilmersdon's famous Jack & Jill nursery rhyme's slate plaques at Kilmersdon School has, after 22 years, retired from his stalwart maintenance role. Gallantly taking over from him, and also perfect for the job, is the village's Martin Horler, who for 31 years was a lecturer in decorating techniques at Trowbridge College and now acts as a consultant in decoration.

At the handover two members of Kilmersdon's Jack and Jill Millennium project committee thanked David for his unstinting care of the plaques and his general enthusiasm for the project and, in appreciation, presented him with a garden voucher. Martin was also thanked for willingly stepping forward to take over David's role. David, who was head of sciences at Bath's Kingswood School, has always been interested in calligraphy and upon retirement in 1999 turned his interest to making sundials having made 300 over the years, including one for GB's Olympic Park and four in Oxford University colleges.

Kilmersdon sign posts

A welcome sight appeared for parishioners over the festive period with the replacement, at both ends of the village, of the heavy vehicle battered sign posts which have been an eyesore since 2019. Thanks must go to Kilmersdon Parish Council which has relentlessly tried to get the signs fixed, and to Somerset County Councillor Mike Pullin who finally managed to expedite matters with the Highways Authority. The new signs seem to be made from a sturdier material, so will hopefully withstand further damage.



Hugh's Views on Champagne

Now that Christmas is over, I'm sure the taste of bubbly of some kind or other is still lingering on your esteemed palates! But what exactly is champagne? What moreover have you been drinking? Prosecco? A pale shadow. Cava? Often very drinkable, sometimes delicious - Freixenet Reserve is among the best. Or have you bought your bubbles from the supermarket? This would give you little idea of what fine champagne is really about. Firstly, it must come from the Champagne region of northern France or the wine cannot be termed champagne at all. In this region, Pinot Noir grapes predominate. Pinot Meunier produces a kind of country cousin and Chardonnay has a recent following but is not as fine as Pinot Noir, though creamily refreshing. The tradition is to combine the qualities of the finest grapes from a wide variety of vineyards in parts of the region which are chalky. This is a fine humidifier for grapes in the cool north of France. The chalk produces vines rich in nitrogen and the warmth of the soil allows the natural yeast to work on the fermentation of the wine. Reims and Épernay are the epicentres of champagne and well worth a lengthy stay. The Montagne de Reims produces grapes high in acidity and wine with delightful bouquet. The Vallée de la Marne, to the west of the region, produces the ripest grapes and a wine with a lovely aroma. The great champagne houses include Pol Roger, Dom Perignon, Krug, Veuve Clicquot, Bollinger and Taittinger, not forgetting

Perrier-Jouët, but to experience them requires the deepest of deep pockets! If your taste for champagne is the increasingly popular rosé variety, the finest is Laurent-Perrier's Réserve, in my humble opinion. Finally, how is champagne made? Briefly, the wine of second fermentation is syphoned off the must and transferred to vats or directly to champagne bottles with added sugar, which is when the ultra strong bottle is trapped by a special cork which produces the bubbles from the gas when the cork is in place and wired down. Some red wine is added to produce the rosé. This is the Méthode Champenoise (phrase of the month!), which has been the tradition for many a year. May much joy attend your drinking!

Gardens open for children's Hospice SW



Would you be willing to open your garden in support of Children's Hospice SW?" asks the Hospice's area fundraiser Emma Parker who, with her father, used to live in School Lane, Kilmersdon.

"The last couple of years have been very difficult and isolating for so many people and particularly for the children and families that we care for at the children' Hospice at Charlton Farm in Wraxall "Many of our families have been shielding their children; many have been too scared to leave their homes, but all are still desperately in need of support to make special memories at a time when it is difficult to do so."

Adapting to the children's and their families needs, the Hospice's care team provides for care in their homes, as well as end of life care at the Hospice, and during the Pandemic the Charlton Farm Gardens have been a sanctuary for the children and their visiting families.

The Hospice relies on donations to continue giving care to local children with life limiting conditions but these have greatly fallen during CV19, and many usual fundraising events have been unable to go ahead.

Wild Flower of the Month, White Bryony - *Bryonia dioica*

White Bryony, Bryonia dioica, is a graceful and vigorous climber which clings to its support by means of tightly coiled tendrils. It has beautiful vine shaped leaves and small greenish white flowers. Somewhat inconspicuous throughout most of the year it becomes most visible during the winter months when its long garlands of shiny green berries turn a bright red, decorating the bare branches of scrub and hedgerow.

These berries are in fact very poisonous so, although they look festive, they are much better left in the hedge rather than being brought into the house. Their poisonous nature is rather strange as Bryony is a member of the cucumber family of plants, Curcurbitaceae, whose cultivated members include the familiar edible plants - marrow, gourd, cucumber, pumpkin and melon.

Far stranger however is the mystery and folklore which surrounds White Bryony. Often known as English Mandrake, its large, fleshy tuberous roots, were once sold by unscrupulous quacks as genuine mandrake roots and so the stories surrounding mandrake became attached to Bryony. The true mandrake, a native of the Mediterranean, is a plant with many magical and superstitious associations. Its root was thought to have powerful aphrodisiac properties and if worn as a charm by women



would help them to conceive. Undoubtedly this was because the forked shape of the root has an uncanny resemblance to a man. Even more mysteriously however, is the myth that mandrake was said to shriek when pulled out of the ground but, having grown it, I can assure you that this is not the case with White Bryony! *Julie Palmer*






Climate change

In memory of Misha Norland 1943 - 2021

Born into a world caught in the cataclysm of the Second World War, within earshot of the bombing of Swansea, Misha's survival was precarious from the beginning. However he was surrounded by love and hope for renewal in the life created by his parents and their companions, who had fled their homes, families and livelihoods in Central Europe.

The household, once relocated to London was a world in itself, sheltered from both the immediate community as well as that of the incoming refugees in Hampstead. His childhood was lonely, with only an adored elder brother who was soon ready to leave home, and the adults who were preoccupied with working and supporting the habits of a father, whose acknowledged genius as a painter lay behind him in a world dismantled by the war.

Misha absorbed himself in solitary pursuits, keeping small mammals, building radios and playing truant in the wild corners of Hampstead Heath when the schooling of the 1950's failed to recognise the impact of dyslexia. Despite these impediments he was open-hearted, a natural confidante and described himself as knowing he was meant to be, whatever circumstances had brought him into life. In his early years at a Church of England primary school, he first encountered the Gospel stories and recognised Jesus as a noble teacher. This sparked a desire to know more and fostered the deep interest in spirituality and philosophy he followed throughout his life.

A succession of different occupations found him

eventually working in the film industry, a career cut short when he took on sole care of his son, Mani. Their deep bond developed through those testing early



years and also surprisingly gave a space for the study of homeopathy, the beginning of his lifelong engagement and dedication to its practice, study and teaching. Eventually a second marriage made a new home in Devon possible, not just for the growing family, but for students, patients and colleagues from around the world, who came to learn more and share in Misha's unique approach to his subject.

His arrival in Kilmersdon in 2018 after a long working life brought him happiness in the beautiful walks and many friendly conversations found here. He had a talent for discovery of the unexpected, coming upon orchids in field edges or unusual garden escapes in the woods, and his photography records his delight in the ephemeral beauty of the natural world. He was a wonderful cook and a generous host. If you ever asked Misha for a recipe, you would be told, "oh, it's easy, I'll tell you!" But then be sure to listen, because it was never written down. Misha liked to do things his own way, always going back to first principles on which one could improvise. His creativity and presence live on, while his person is deeply missed.

Parish Council News

Can you help please?

Somerset County Council actively encourages self-help within the community. This is particularly effective for minor maintenance such as clearing vegetation, sign cleaning and clearing debris off gully covers for example. Minor works of this nature can safeguard communities from events such as flooding but also provide enhancements to the community that would otherwise may not be possible due to budget constraints at the County Council. Would you be willing to give some of your time to form a volunteer group to remove some of the weeds in the pavements and gullies in the village from time to time?
