There was a long queue for both and it was a relief that there was just enough to go round. The final draw was held at 9.30p.m. for the Jubilee Beacon Draw, which was won by Dide







Hugh's Views on ...Port



Hugh's views on Port, so called because Oporto is the epicentre of production.

"Any Port in a storm". I don't think so! Let us be more selective. Firstly I expect you know a lot about this delectable digestif, but in case you don't I am going to give a brief account of what port is and how it is produced.

Port is fortified Portuguese wine. How is it different from other wines from Portugal? The method of fortification is the key. In the ratio of 1 to 4 brandy is added to the second fermentation of the grapes before that fermentation is complete. Traditionally the method of extracting the must is by treading the grapes, this had been so for more than 300 hundred years. Feet are warm which is important and they are also very effective. Technology has produced excellent methods of extracting the must, but the finest wine emerges from Portuguese feet and was largely done by the women of the house as was the harvest. The growers swear that the foot beats the vast autovinifiers and robotic "lagares", computer controlled methods of replicating the gentle action of the human foot, as if the pips are crushed, this makes the juice bitter. Huge concerns like Symingtons use the computers for efficiency and to keep down costs. Most port, however, is produced by small farmers, thousands of them, in rambling white houses called Ouintas with tiled floors which are cool and beautiful. The Douro valley is the ideal region for Port and the steep hillsides are terraced so that more vines can be grown than on the mountainsides and both sun and air have a vital effect. Tawny (Red) port is produced from red grapes, the skins giving the colour before treading

separates the wine from the must. White Port derives from white coloured grapes. Rough port outlived itself. Mass marketing in the 70s brought over production and poor wine, just as with Sherry. The post exported today is of better quality, as the indifferent producers went out of business.

The wine harvest is a time of huge entertainment and colourful celebration, in spite of the hard work involved. The date is dictated by the weather which varies enormously. Mid September is the probable date. Many hazards make life difficult - drought, rain during fruit set and erosion are real risks. Only 3 out 10 years give good conditions hence the losses often incurred. Phylloxera wiped out vast numbers of vineyards in the 1970s. Finally, to be more selective. Here are a few tips as you scan the supermarket shelves! If the label is dated that is a good sign. The best port has matured in huge blackened oak barrels called pipes holding 550 to 600 litres for 20 to 40 years or even longer. If the label claims a vintage that is also good. Port should always be decanted to allow the sediment to be retained in the bottom of the bottle. Symington's, Sandiman's, Graham's and Taylor's are renowned shippers and producers and guarantee quality.

Good hunting and don't forget that too much port does you no good at all.

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In May we were treated to the illustrated story of how Colin 'Higgy' Higgins from Yatton started with a blank canvas 140 by 30 feet at his new home in 2010 to create his child friendly, wildlife welcoming garden. Next to agricultural land and enclosed by a hawthorn hedge, it contains the essential elements of Water, Food and Shelter to attract wildlife and establish an integrated ecosystem

An important element is the six ponds including a Belfast sink, a sunken bath, a deep koi pond and a wide shallow pond, with beaches all clearly demarked for child safety. Toads and newts, damsel flies and dragon flies quickly moved in.

The garden includes long and medium grass and flowers that are attractive to native pollinators. A mixed cover of shrubs has gradually grown up for shelter and has encouraged a wide variety of birds like Goldfinches, Bull finches who enjoy Ragwort and fruit like blackberries. Bread is not good for small birds. Insects enjoy the fruit as well. Higgy's selection of annual and perennial

flowering plants Verbena, Veronica, Scabious, cornflowers, corn marigolds, attract insects which are an important base to the food chain.

Shelter is offered in hedgehog boxes, rotting wood, bird boxes. There are many invertebrates like beetles, ladybirds slugs and snails. Lots of butterflies find their way to the garden like the skipper, tortoiseshell and panted lady. There are grass snakes too and small mammals such as mice and moles. A variety of dens and play areas make the garden a place for children too.

In May we also had our Annual Plant Sale. All our usual customers were back in force to make it a great success after the break. A big 'Thank you' to everyone who came for their support.

We enjoyed the June talk from Duncan Bird that was very topical being just after Prince William mentioned Rachell Carson during the Jubilee Celebrations. Her seminal book was published in the US in 1962 and brought attention to the effects of chemicals like DDT and how they entered the food chain and

gradually became more concentrated killing the top predators and the song birds – hence the 'silent spring'.

Rachel Carson born in 1907 grew up on the Allegheny River where her mother introduced her to the natural world. At university in she changed from English to Biology and then went on to study zoology joining the Wildlife Service in 1935. This was when she became concerned about the environmental impact of the indiscriminate impact of man-made chemicals on the natural environment.

Her warning was that people need to learn how to live with nature not aim to conquer it. The aerial spraying of crops with DDT mixed with fuel oil was toxic and persistent. She campaigned against the big chemical companies, who in turn tried to discredit her because she was a woman without a doctorate and called her a communist 'Silent Spring' was published in 1962 and came to the attention of President Kennedy. The next year a documentary by CBS gave a graphic representation of the ecological impact and raised public awareness. A White House report led to the phasing out of DDT. Rachel Carson died in 1964 but her legacy through her work is carried on. Sir David Attenborough's latest book 'A Life on our Planet' reviews impacts and changes over his lifetime.

In Britain it was felt that farmers kept to the regulations on pesticides so we did not have same scale of problem as the US. The major oil spill from the stranded Torrey Canyon super tanker in 1967 raised awareness of the quantities of toxic chemicals threatening the environment. The current debate is around the impact of banned neo-nicotinoids on the fall in the bee and pollinator population. The sugar beet crop is being attached by a fly resistant to many other pesticides.

On Wednesday 13th July Terry Stevens will give a talk on '*Tyntesfield: the gardens and estate*'. On August 10th Carrie Packham will give her postponed talk on '*The cultivation and growing of unusual herbs*'. The meetings are at 7.30pm in Kilmersdon Village Hall. Visitors will be very welcome. There are refreshments and a raffle each week.

I Can and I Am update



Following up my article in last month's Parish Magazine, I'm delighted to report that my colleagues and I managed to complete our row across the Bristol Channel in early May to raise funds for our charity, I Can and I Am.

The journey took us from Ilfracombe in Devon to The Mumbles in south Wales, a crossing of 26 miles across the second strongest tidal surge in the world. The crossing necessitated a very early start to catch the right tide, so after spending the previous night near the town, we set off just before 7am in pretty good conditions. Our only previous experience of the boat had been on a river in Suffolk, so the choppy waters provided extremely challenging conditions at times, not least for my boss James who has very limited sight.

We arrived in The Mumbles in bright sunshine around 10.5 hours after we set off, all pretty shattered but with a great sense of achievement. The row itself provided the full range of emotions we'd been warned to expect - apprehension, excitement, exhilaration, fatigue, reflection, boredom, elation and many more.

The whole experience taught us all a lot about ourselves, the value of preparation and most importantly teamwork - as soon as you lose rhythm, everything goes wrong!

We were extremely lucky to be supported by a huge number of donors, not least our lead sponsor Howdens; at the final count we managed to raise over £75,000. This money will go directly towards keeping our double decker bus on the road - we visit schools and universities offering workshops alongside pizza making, aimed at improving self belief. Currently school budgets are so tight that there's very limited budget for 'wellbeing', so with our fundraising efforts we're usually able to offer the bus services free of charge.

Keep your eyes peeled for the bus, we're often out and about locally; we've just spent a week at Norton Hill and we'll be at Writhlington before the end of this term. Do come and say hello if you see us!

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
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
