Kilmersdon Gardeners June 2023 A Tale of Two Gardens: Pauline and David Wright

This illustrated talk captured the skill and pleasure Pauline and David experienced creating two gardens from scratch. They give talks and open their garden to raise funds for a head and neck cancer charity founded by the surgeon who treated Pauline

In the 1980's they bought a run-down house and garden in Somerset intriguingly called 'Lift the Latch', not an instruction on the gate but the house name. They were fortunate to have the beginnings of a pond which after much excavation provided the focus of the garden. With such a large area to tend and aiming for all year-round colour they selected trees and shrubs with colourful stems and foliage. Salix Flamingo has redstems in the winter and pink and white foliage in the summer. Liquid Amber is a shrub that has acer like leaves and maintains russet red foliage throughout the year. Spring blooming Rhododendrons and Azaleas added rich colour. Laburnum with its vellow flowers in early summer was a favourite until it became unsafe and was felled. The owners have a small vase created from a branch by a wood turning friend as a memento. Pauline didn't go for annuals but enjoyed lower growing perennials like Rosanne Geranium to give colour and ground cover through the summer. She also enjoyed poking in false plants around the garden to provide colour and talking points. The garden attracted a variety of birds including kingfishers.

In 2007 they featured in a BBC gardening programme with Carol Klein about how to



get into the National Garden Scheme Yellow Book. They found it hard to go along with the way the programme makers created a narrative rather than following the real-life scenario. In 2020, although it was hard to let go, they moved on to a bungalow 'Little Latch' where they are nearer their grandchildren. They have started from scratch to create similarly colourful garden from the blank canvas of the space around the bungalow. They had plenty of practice along the way creating utilitarian small gardens for friends and family.

Next talk 'Organic Gardening – working with nature' – Oliver Jones. This includes the 'Potted Plant' competition for members plants that have lived with them for at least 6 months. Wednesday 12th July 2023 - 7.15pm for a 7.30pm start at Kilmersdon Village Hall. Refreshments and raffle on arrival. Visitors are very welcome. www.kilmersdongardeners.org

In memory of Stephen Robert Wood

Born 6/11/1954 at The Royal Alexander Hospital, Plymouth to Frank & Tegwen Wood

Most of you probably don't know about Steve's life. He was born in Plymouth to Frank & Tegwen Wood, educated at Ford Primary, going on to Ford Secondary Modern. However, he spent most of his childhood living with his parents & grandparents by the sea, with his sisters Sian & Sarah. He would follow his grandad round the garden like a shadow, and spent most weekends rock-pooling with the family at local beaches.

Steve never wanted his first baby sister, but was convinced that Mum was bringing a puppy home from hospital. Disappointed, he called Sian 'Rebel' after an alsatian he had seen in a film! This name stuck for many years!! When he was 11, their sister Sarah was born, making the family complete.

When Steve was 13, his dad was posted to Singapore for 3 years to deal with the handover of the dockyards to the Singapore government. So, off they all sailed on the P&O liner "Chitral" (all first class!) This was a real eye-opener for the whole family, but as kids, it opened a whole new world of adventure!

During the six-week journey, they called into ports in the Canary Islands, South Africa, India, Sri Lanka and Malaya. As first-time travellers going over the Equator, they had to perform the official 'Crossing the Line' ceremony to ask for 'Lord Neptune's permission!

On arrival in Singapore port early one morning in October, they ran on deck, only to see Frank's brother Ron, a sailor in the merchant Navy, on the pier wating with a welcome wave!!

At first they lived in a bungalow near the village of Sembawang Springs, then 6 months later, they moved onto the naval base. Steve and his sister Sian went to Bourne military school, then Steve transferred to St. John's when he was 15. Both were very strict establishments, the day starting at 7:00am but they were in the local swimming pools by 14:00hrs, as school finished by 13:00hrs each day! Holidays were spent off the island, normally on the sandy beaches of the east coast of Malaya. Elephants, crocodiles and lots of lizards were a regular sight!

After the three years, Frank was posted back to Scotland, to the Royal Naval Dockyard, Rosyth, Dunfermline. So the family travelled back to the UK and settled into Scottish life in Dumfermline. Steve decided to go to agricultural college in Cooper to study farm management, and work as an apprentice at a local farm.

A few years later, he met Lucy Hunter and after a year they married and lived in a small flat in Dunfermline. Very soon, however, they decided to emigrate to Canada and within six months, they were living in Hamilton, west of Toronto, on an extremely large farm! The whole family in the UK went to visit and enjoyed trips to the Great Lakes, Niagara Falls and across the border into the USA to see distant cousins in Pennsylvania! After 2 years, Steve & Lucy had a son, but unfortunately life was very lonely on a remote farm and the marriage failed, resulting in them moving back to the UK separately then divorcing. Steven, their son who was $2\frac{1}{2}$ at the time, went to live with his mum in Portsmouth

After 9 years in Scotland, Steve's Dad moved back to Bath, working at MOD Foxhill & living in Clandown. Steve decided to move back to join them & worked for the Milk Marketing Board, then as a builder, when he found the travelling was too much.

A few years later, he met Diane Aldum and they decided to get married. They lived happily in Writhlington, having three children - Scott, Shannon and Alice. However, when the children were teenagers, sadly their mother died, leaving Steve to bring up three teenagers!

Time passed and he met Janet McIntyre, who's husband had also died, and as they had many interests in common, including gardening and the church, Steve decided to move in with her in Kilmersdon. where they were happy for many years – and contributed a lot to the village.

Steve was eventually diagnosed with cancer and struggled with health for a number of years. More recently he seemed to be doing OK, but after he collapsed over the Coronation weekend he was taken to the RUH & his family were told to be prepared, as he might not survive. This is where he remained for his final few days, passing away peacefully on 17 May 2023, surrounded by his Children.

He will be sadly missed by all who knew him in Kilmersdon!

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

What's so Interesting about Kilmersdon?

I thought I would start with the Toll Road or Kilmersdon Hill as we know it.

The line of the original road up the hill can now just be just seen as a sunken road in the field with Gallows Ash, which were three cottages, on the right-hand side of the road going up the hill.

Here below is a photo of a map of 1839 which shows in red ink the proposed realignment of Kilmersdon Hill road which includes removing the Toll House from the top of the hill and building a new Toll House at the bottom of the hill.

This road was part of the Buckland Dinham Turnpike Trust which was established in 1768, a very small Trust with just 19 miles of road BUT very strategically placed for the trustees to see a hansom return for their investment as their roads were on a coal route – about forty coal waggons a day were passing through their toll-gates. In 1820 the income of the Buckland Trust was £1,265.00. I think the old road which went passed Tumblers Bottom, together with the old road, was then abandoned.

An interesting entry in the Vestry Minutes ...13th February 1840 states -

'discussion on the re-alignment of the road (Kilmersdon Hill) to be opened to the public on 29th September (Michaelmas Day) 1841' So we know that Kilmersdon Hill came into being on 29th September 1841.


August 1859 for bringing the Iron Chest from the Vicarage to the Church Turnpike charge $4\frac{1}{2}$ d (four and a half pence)



Parliamentary By-election

A by-election will take place on 20 July 2023 following the resignation of our MP David Warburton. This will be the first election here where you will need to bring photo id. If you do not have a driving license, bus pass, passport or other acceptable form of id, you can apply for a 'Voter Authority Certificate'. It is not difficult. You can apply online here: https://www.gov.uk/apply-for-photo-id-voter-authority-certificate or there is a form available if you wish to apply by post. If you need help to find the form you can contact the Parish Council. You can still also apply for a postal vote as normal.

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
