

What's so Interesting about Kilmersdon? Law and Order making

There would have been a Parish Constable from the 14th century, appointed originally by the Baronial Court and the Court-Leet, then later, from about 1842, by The Ecclesiastical Vestry Court. Some historians say the office of Parish Constable goes back to King Arthur or at least Saxon times. The Parish Constable was empowered with the Right of Arrest, he was conservator of the peace within the Parish, he would put felons in the stocks or the lock-up. He was also responsible for raising and provisioning the Parish Militia as well as the safe custody and maintenance of the Parish Armoury – Pikes, Muskets, Swords etc. **THE VILLAGE POUND**



There were actually two Pounds in Kilmersdon, as shown by the arrows on this map. One was a Dog Pound which seems logical, you wouldn't want to put a stray dog into a Pound with a load of sheep!

The Village pound was a feature of most British medieval villages.

A high walled and lockable structure it served several purposes; the most common use was to hold stray sheep, pigs and cattle until they were claimed by the owners, usually for the payment of a fine or levy. Early pounds had just briar hedges but most were built in stone or brick making them more stock-proof. We don't know what the Kilmersdon Pound was constructed of. The village pound was sometimes also used as an early form of gaol or lock-up to hold petty criminals such as rustlers, thieves, and vagabonds until they could be dealt with by the local court. The pound was often associated with the village stocks as a place of public humiliation and punishment. (as described in The Pickwick Papers Mr Pickwick being put in the Pound at Dingley Dell)

Nearly every village once had its pound for stray cattle, pigs, geese, etc. to be driven into and there kept at the expense of the owner, till such time as he should pay the fine (the amount claimed by the person on whose land they had strayed, for damage done), and the fee to the pound keeper, man or sometimes woman, for feeding and watering the same. If not claimed in three weeks, the animals were driven to the nearest market and sold, the proceeds going to the impounder and pound-keeper. The person who found the animals on his land cut a stick and made notches, one for every beast, (called a tally-stick) and then split the stick down the centre of the notches so that half each notch appeared on each piece of stick; one half he kept, the other he gave to the pound-keeper. When the owner came to redeem his property and had paid for the damage done, the impounder gave him his half stick. He took this to the pound-keeper, and if the two pieces tallied, it proved he had paid and his beast was freed. Hence the word tally-stick and the pound-keeper being referred to as the tallyman" In a Court Leet of 1725 here in Kilmersdon, Robert Hughes was fined £5 (a huge amount of money) to the lady of the manor for heaving his sheep over the wall of the pound (called, I think, pound-breach)




In September the Gardeners heard about 'Trug Making' from expert Carl Sadler. A Trug is constructed like a small clinkerbuilt boat with a keel. Carl favours using Ash in summer and Sweet Chestnut in winter for the frame with White Willow for the strips. Ash die-back has caused lots of problems, as the bark peels off from the wood of diseased trees. He uses copper nails that have become expensive. He can put together 6 trugs in an hour but preparing the wood takes many hours before the assembly process. He uses a throw, an axe, and a draw knife. He smooths them off and rubs in linseed oil to finish. He also makes traditional hurdles in a range of sizes. Carl attends a lot of agricultural shows across the country and enjoys his interaction with the public. He

took over from his father and is hoping that his 11-year-old grandson will follow him. He is also a creative carpenter and makes props for films. He has worked on 'Star Wars' and 'Wicked', creating chairs for Luke Sky Walker and looms for witch Ariana Grande. This was tricky when the size of the stars was wrongly estimated but led to an interesting encounter with Daniel Craig in his storm trooper cameo role on the set of 'The Force Awakens'. Carl was a striking presence on the stage of the hall surrounded by his hurdles and trugs as shown in the photograph. The Gardeners were very impressed and keen to purchase original trugs and hurdles direct from their maker. In October, James Cross described how the Bishop's Palace Gardens in Wells have developed from the 13th Century and

during his nearly 20 years as Head Gardener. He has created an interesting garden for all seasons with many new beds and borders in the 14 acres, with his team of 3 full time assistants and 40 volunteers. The croquet lawn is separated from the

south lawn by the remaining wall of the ruined Great Hall The borders on either side of the wall include plants to create interest for all seasons. The wall was an important feature of the Victorian garden design of Bishop Laws with strategically planted trees to create a 'Picturesque' space to entertain his guests. This style continues with a mature Ginkgo, Mulberry, Tulip and Indian Bean.



The ramparts are planted with bulbs and primroses which create a wonderful display in the spring. Under the Evergreen Oak is the stumpery with a variety of ferns and damp loving plants such as hostas, forget-me-nots, and hellebores. The east parterre garden has been completely redesigned and the box edging replaced with euonymus. The photograph shows where the wide path below the oriel window was replaced with attractive planting of a magnolia, fig tree, salvias, and day lilies. The edging of the knot garden picks up the portcullis motif from the window. The corner of the garden near the swing has more modern informal prairie planting.

Across the Willow Bridge, beneath the golden weeping willow are the outer gardens. In the boggy area around St Andrews Wells is the reflecting pool



created by Bishop Laws with a border planted by Mary Keen in 2002. The planting of the damp area by the board walk was influenced by the Beth Chatto Garden. The Arboretum, with its spring bulbs was planted by Bishop Bickersteth, a keen gardener, for the Oueen's Silver Jubilee in 1977 The area once the Kitchen Garden is now a community garden providing vegetables for the

café and the bishop's family as well as allotments for local people. The next meeting is Wednesday 8th November 2023 - 7.15pm for a 7.30pm start at Kilmersdon Village Hall. Dr Frances Burroughes will talk on 'A Victorian Head Gardener.' Refreshments and raffle on arrival. Visitors are very welcome, see website for further details. On Saturday December 2nd 10am to 12.30pm there will be a wreath making workshop in the hall £35 to include materials and refreshments visitors welcome. 
